The lead organization for the SECCS implementation project is the State of Hawaii Department of Health's (DOH) Title V Agency, Family Health Services Division (FHSD) . FHSD aims to assure that all families, women, men, pregnant women, parents, infants, children, children with special health needs, and adolescents receive quality prevention and intervention services based on their individual needs (includes children w/special health needs and maternal and child health branches). This Division includes the Maternal and Child Health Branch (MCHB); Children with Special Health Needs Branch (CSHNB); Women, Infants, Children (WIC). The DOH's Dental Health Division leads collaborative efforts to reduce the rate of childhood dental caries by ensuring that each child has an appropriate dental home and is accessing routine care. DOH also provides mental health services through its DOH's Early Intervention Section, which serves children from birth to age 3, and the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division, which serves children aged 3-17. The Hawaii Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems Grant Program (ECCS): The ECCS plan seeks to organize, build upon and integrate existing early care and education milestones by ensuring that the safety and health systems in place are well integrated into an overall school readiness framework. Existing strategic plans that currently address the arenas of Safety, Health and Readiness have also been incorporated, in addition to research on best practices in system development and direct service strategies. A statewide needs assessment/environmental scan of existing resources, identification of gap areas, and a description of overall service integration strengths and challenges was conducted during the planning process. A Title V Needs Assessment which mapped Hawaii's Maternal and Child Health Branch capacity was also recently completed and the results were included in the MCH Services Title V Block Grant Program application for Fiscal Year 2006. 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Hawaii has been engaged in early childhood system building for almost a decade, with a focus on coordinating a continuum of early care and education services toward the positive result of school readiness for all children. However, there are numerous issues that challenge efforts to create a healthy, safe and nurturing environment for Hawaii's young children. Many early childhood programs and services are highly fragmented and operate independently of one another, often competing for the same funds. Families must sort through multiple, at times conflicting, requirements placed on them by separate programs. There have also been limited efforts to develop common service plans for families because of bureaucratic and privacy issues. Hawaii's escalating housing prices have continued to intensify the issue of lack of affordable housing throughout its islands. Families with children are becoming the fastest growing segment of the homeless population, often being forced to remain in temporary housing shelters for years as they wait for public housing units to become available. 14.6% of the homeless population are between 0-17 years old, and 72% of low-income families with children spend more than 30% of their income on housing. In Hawaii, there are nearly 83,000 children under age 5. Of these, 1 in 5 live in poverty; 1 in 14 are without health insurance; and only 56% of children entering Kindergarten were assessed as ready by Kindergarten teachers. 37% of families with children under 5 live below 185% of the Federal Poverty Level, and 101,570 children aged 0-19 are enrolled in the Medicaid program. Also, children under the age of 8 suffer from some of the worst oral health conditions in the U.S. (e.g., baby bottle tooth decay, dental caries, and untreated dental decay).
